Many of our students don't have computers, internet or mobile devices at home – or the ability to effectively use technology - which could severely limit the benefits they might otherwise experience in online learning.

I am truly excited to be here and eager to begin – though admittedly a little bit nervous about where I will fit all of my extra learning and homework into my already busy schedule.
